WHITE SALMON

Cooperative weather reports for 24-hour period ending 5 p. m. Saturday: Maximum temperature 68, minimum 36 above zero; clear; brisk east wind.

The Lyle road between the intersection of the Snowdon highway at Gatchell Hill and Law's corner has been graded, and widened below the M. L. Kline place. This shortens the route for motorists to the Burdoin Heights and Burdoin Mountain districts.

Richard J. Bates and son, Bill Hall, motored up from Portland Saturday for a few days' visit at their Burdoin Heights home.

This community was shocked by the accidental killing of Glenn Knutson, son of Gilbert Knutson, former jeweler here, when the car he was driving skidded off the Columbia River highway 10 miles east of Hood River last Wednesday afternoon, and also by the sad accident which befell the party of young folks en route to White Salmon when their car plunged over the White Salmon river bridge wall at Humam, a sheer drop of 50 feet, killing Miss Neva Vaughn, 14-year-old Humam girl and badly injuring Miss Ione Anderson, daughter of W. P. Anderson. Other young people riding in the car were: Miss Georgia Sulway and brother, Daniel, who were riding in the front seat with the driver, Thomas Hoffman, of Gilmea. In the back seat were Scott Teal, Mr. Chesney, Ione Anderson and Neva Vaughn. That all members of the party were not killed or seriously injured is considered a miracle.

Funeral services for Glen Knutson were held at the Methodist church Friday afternoon with interment at Odd Fellows cemetery here.

Although a minimum temperature of 30 above zero was recorded at the Burdoin Heights weather station April 23, no material damage by frost is apparent. The total amount of precipitation from April 18 to 25 inclusive was .13 of an inch.

Some of the growers in this district who depended upon Hood River for spray material for the calyx dust spray were sorely disappointed in being unable to secure fresh stock, necessitating purchase of the material in San Francisco. Old raground stuff is considered ineffective and is not wanted by the majority of growers here.
