**CRUTCHFIELD SEES
A BIG APPLE CROP**

J. S. Crutchfield, president of the
American Fruit Growers, Inc., large
apple distributing agency, who was
here last week after a tour of the
Yakima and Wenatchee districts, said
blossoms were heavy in all sections.
Weather conditions were ideal for pol-
lination of the fruit, and unless sub-
sequent weather conditions are unfa-
vorable, Mr. Crutchfield, whose home is
in Pittsburgh, said the stage is set for
a record tonnage of Pacific northwest
boxed apples.

"At this early stage," said Mr.
Crutchfield, "it would be unwise to at-
tempt anything like a definite tonnage
of the boxed apple crop, for the June
drop must be taken into consideration.
Then we may get a hustful frost in the
next 10 days. Just at present, how-
ever, everything is looking promising."

Mr. Crutchfield said that the big pro-
ducing apple section of New York, the
tonnage of which was immense last
year, should be light this season, a
condition that will have a favorable
effect on the marketing of boxed fruit.

W. C. T. U. NOTES

The actual anti-Volstead and wet
forces in the house are an uncertain
quantity. About all that is known is
that these elements are much too weak
to do anything more than make a few
gestures, says the Philadelphia Public
Ledger. "The call sent out by a com-
mittee of 58 would-be modifiers of the
dry law must be regarded as just an-
other of these gestures. They are stir-
ring publicity to the anti-prohibition
campaign, but that is about all."

"The committee in fact is purely un-
official and is trying to recruit other
members. These representatives come
from 'wet districts.' Some of them are
pledged to seek modification of the pro-
hibition law. There is a congressional
campaign at hand and they wish to be
able to point out something they have
done; something that will satisfy 'wet'
constituents until after the election. It
would be about as easy to drain the
Atlantic ocean into the Sahara desert
as it would be to weaken the Volstead
act in the 69th Congress."

schools. The Portland teachers have
a resolution upholding prohibition. For
lack of time Mrs. Davenport just
touched the high spots of her speech.

very fine paper on "What We Candi-
dates Expect to Do if Elected." Mrs.
J. R. Nickelsen, legislative super-tend-
ent, had charge of the program. There
were dainty refreshments served at a
late hour.
