Workers on the new grade to do away with the highway bridge over Deer creek on the Lost Lake road are meeting with a serious delay in the completion of the work owing to a flood of water that is gushing out of the hillsides in all directions. The water is said to be due to seepage from the dam irrigation works. The water channels are so numerous that it is not possible to direct them into one main stream, making it necessary to provide a separate outlet for most of them before the work can proceed.
