Cage trials at many different times also showed this repeatedly. Although knowing for certain last sea-son that his bait was entirely efficient, Forsell desired still one more senson of trial and demonstration of its effective-ness before announcing the discovery. ness before announcing the discovery So this season just past, experiments trials were-repeated on caged beetle and extensive field trials were carrie on. In all of these the bait again proved consistently efficient in destroy

ing beetles. The material is applied dry to the fields by walking along the rows and throwing a spoonful down into the crown of each plant. The material is crown of each plant. The material is best placed down among the stalks of the leaves and stems, as that is where the beetles are and where they gather. One man can balt three acres a day in this way. This method of treatment takes approximately 100 pounds to the acre where the plants are in the hill system. The bait remains on the plant crown and is effective for a long period up to the time heavy rains start. Ar-rangements are being made to have the material available through co-operative organizations and interested cannery-men. It will be labeled and sold under the regulations of both state and fed-eral laws. eral laws.

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
