STRAWBERRY ROOT WEEVIL CONQUERED

The strawberry root weevil is no familiar enemy that it scarcely needs to be described, as everyone who has grown strawberries has had at least some experience with it.

As well known as the damage is done by the grub eating off the roots, thus killing the plant. A few beetles appear in the field the second season after planting and the eggs from these centers cause sufficient damage to render the fields unprofitable.

During the past few seasons the situation has been getting worse, the most infested areas are planted on the well established strawberry growing districts and forcing many growers to cease growing strawberries and to enter other lines of production.

Experience in the past has shown that any remedy for the control of the weevil must have several features, chief among which are that it must be easily applied, must be effective, must be low in cost.
