GREISEN NOTICES **MUCH IMPROVEMENT**

C. R. Greisen, formerly located here as business manager of Better Fruit, who is now a representative of the Republic truck sales corporation for Oregon and who arrived here last week, says that he notices numerous striking developments'in Hood River vailey during his few years of absence. He says the Mount Hood Loop highway has brought about the greatest change.

"It made me feel like being in another land," said Mr. Greisen, "when I drove out over the Loop road. It gives one many magnificent views, whereas on the old road one got a glimpse of the West Side only from the old rock crusher point."

Mr. Greisen says that Hood River has two buildings that might grace a metropolitan point—the Mt. Hood hotel and the Butler bank building.

"One rarely ever finds such places as these in a town the size of Hood River," he said. "Hood River folk will take a pride in showing the lobby and rooms of the Mt. Hood hotel to their visitors. Mrs. C. A. Bell and Fred Bell have rendered Hood River a service in the inprovement of the hotel. The Butler bank structure is as fine as you will find anywhere."

Mr. Greisen expresses the belief that Hood River would be able to dispose of many more high class apples in Portland were the sale of such fruit pushed. He thinks a store for the sale of the best local apples should be established.

"Provision should be made to deliver the apples anywhere in the city at a reasonable rate," he stated. "I believe if such a service were properly advertised, Portland people would soon get the habit of buying Hood River apples by the box."

Peaches Keep in Cold Storage An experiment of H. S. Galligan, who grew the fruit on his east side orchard place, has demonstrated that peaches may be kept in cold storage. Mr. Galligan placed a quantity of ripe peaches of the J. H. Hale variety in a refrigerated room August 24. The peaches, removed last week, were in excellent condition. They had retained their firmness and were of good flavor.
