Following is the essay by Waukena Endicott: A young seedling tree that is around a year old is taken and the top are cut off from the tree and destroyed.

The trees are set between 25 to 30 feet apart. In cultivating a young orchard the plow is used first. The plow should be six to eight inches deep so as to provide a deep covering of plowed ground, and to cut the surface roots off of the new trees and make them go deeper into the soil where they will be kept cooler during the hot weather.
