thing like a pair of scissors. This clips the branches. Some of the other tools used are a saw and pruning shears.

They spray here three or four times a season. One of the times when they have to spray is when the woolly aphis begins to come on. They spray with Black Leaf 40 and soap. They spray when the blossoms come on for scab. This is sprayed with lime and sulphur. The thinning begins to come on in July and August. The way you thin is to look on your tree for a cluster of apples. Then you pull off all of the apples but the largest one, which you leave banging.

apples. Then you pull off all of the apples but the largest one, which you leave hanging.

After a while the branches of the tree begin to be so loaded with fruit they have to be propped. This is done with a long pole. At the top is a V-shape, which looks something like a wish bone. They take the pole and prop the tree up. This keeps it from breaking the branches off of the tree.

Now the harvest comes. They determine the picking by the color of the apple and the seed. When the red apple reaches a good red color and the seed is a dark brown the apple is ripe. The yellow apple also is determined. The apples are picked here as soon as the maturity is up. The reason for this is because the apples have to be sent so far away. We begin the harvest here in the early part of September. The apples are picked and put in a large apple picking bag, then dumped carefully into apple boxes. The best picker can pick about 100 boxes a day. The apple boxes are stacked in the field till a large wagon comes along and takes them to the packing house where they are unloaded.

The apples are then dumped in the large bins, where there are chutes going out from each. This is the grader. Sorters stand on each side and sort them into extra fancy, fancy and C grades. The culls are sent on down
