

The Dick test for the recognition of susceptibility to scarlet fever is carried out by injecting into the skin a very minute amount of the diluted scarlet fever toxin. If the person is a ble there will appear, at the sight of the injection, a zone of redness of about the size of a penny. This redness is most marked at the end of 24 hours, at which time the test should be read, and rapidly fades thereafter. Persons immune to scarlet fever no reaction whatever.
