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SCREEN AND STAGE

"Millionaires," the Warner Bros. production which comes to the Rialto theatre Saturday, is a picture that goes out frankly to get laughs, and, according to all reports, it gets them in hearty measure. With George Sidney, Louise Fazenda and Gordon headlining the cast, it has a trio of rib-tickling fun-makers, who have long since demonstrated that real laughs are pretty close to real tears; a trio of comedians who are above all things "human."

Helene Costello, Nat Carr, Jane Winton and Arthur Lubin are among others in the cast who add to the gaiety of the entertainment. The picture, suggested by E. Phillips Oppenheim's book, "The Inevitable Millionaire," was adapted by Graham Baker and Edward Clark, and produced under the direction of Herman Raymaker. The story, written by Raymond L. Schrock, concerns a Jewish tailor, whose placid, happy life is nearly wrecked on the shores of social ambition, when he suddenly comes into a fortune.

"A Comedy of Horrors." So Lloyd Bacon, director of Warner's "Finger Prints," describes this Arthur Somers Roche comedy-melodrama-mystery-spook story, which comes to the Rialto theatre next Sunday.

Louise Fazenda, that lady of laugh-
ter, is the star, and she creates one of
the most droll characters of her rollick-
ing repertoire. In reality a seagull
service agent, she fools all the crooks
and cops and conspirators into believ-
ing that she is simply dumb Dora
Traynor, maid of all work, in the house
of horrors which is locale for the story.

Crook jargon usually includes nick-
names for all the people in its world,
and in this particular "Finger Prints"
is true to type. Warner Richmond is
known as "Annie Laurie" Norton;
George Nichols is "Sweeney"; Martha
Mattox plays the part of "Mother"
Malone; Franklin Pangborn is "The
Bandoline Kid"; William Demarest,
"Cuffs" Egan; Robert Perry, "Hard-
boiled" Ryan; Ed Kennedy, "O. K."
McDuff; Jerry Miley, "Chicago Ed,"
and Doc Stone, "Cabbage Head" Mc-
Carthy. Featured in the cast are
Helene Costello and John T. Murray.

"Finger Prints" deals with the at-
tempt of a gang of criminals, who have
robbed the mails of five million dollars,
to locate the hiding place after they get
out of prison, and of the efforts of the
Department of Justice to catch them,
red-handed. It is here that the sly,
frightened, irresistible fun of Fazenda
comes into its own.

Adolphe Menjou may remain Uncle
Sam's suave sophisticate, Harold Lloyd
should keep on as America's perennial
playboy, Jack Holt can continue up-
holding the honor of the West, Bebe
Daniels may well stay on as Holly-
wood's joyful tomboy but—as for Wal-
lace Beery and Raymond Hatton—let
them continue to be the screen's fun-
niest comedy team, in films similar to
1926's fun fest, "Behind the Front."

Paramount officials realized the pub-
lic demand for a sequel to the first
"sunny side of the war" picture and
cast about for another good story.
Monty Brice, adaptor of the earlier
production, handed in an original
script, which upon being read caused
everyone to fall into convulsions of
laughter. It's name? "We're in the
Navy Now."

And so—the picture which comes to
the Rialto theatre Monday Tuesday
and Wednesday, traces the lives of a
prize fighter and his manager from the
day they innocently join the Navy till
their final return to the ring. If you
don't believe it, be checked out of
shrieks, listen to one typical situation.
After having been vamped by a
nurse aboard ship, the boys are asked
to take her over the side in a rowboat.
They do this and she suddenly van-
ishes into thin air. Lost in a fog, their
boat is cut in two by an immense
dreadnaught. Picked up by rescuers,
they tell of their adventures with a
whole fleet of submarines. "Then—but
why continue? "We're in the Navy
Now" is really a life-saver in a sea of
inferior productions.

BOY SCOUT NEWS

The Mid-Columbia area, Boy Scouts
of America, will join with a new dis-
trict to include the Central Oregon
area if such a merger meets with the
approval of the Bend district. It was
voted at a meeting of The Dalles coun-
cil last Thursday night.

The proposed merger is being spon-
sored by John Piper of Bend, who has
been studying the situation for some
time and believes the Central Oregon
area would sponsor such a move. Mr.
Piper represented Bend at The Dalles
last Thursday.

The proposed joining of forces will
be discussed at a meeting at Bend
within a short time, and should the
plateau district favor the merger, a
general meeting of representatives of
both districts will be called in The
Dalles about January 22 to elect of-
ficers and establish a plan of action.
It is hoped that the merger will re-
sult in increased efficiency and activity
in scout work and will lessen the finan-
cial burden in the different communi-
ties. President F. V. Galloway, of The
Dalles, explained.

As an instance, he pointed out that
the budget for the mid-Columbia area
alone was \$4750 from June 1 to June 1,
while the budget for the proposed in-
creased area would be but \$5000, with
a much greater area from which to
draw financial assistance.

A motion was made last Thursday
night that the mid-Columbia area
adopt a proposed constitution for the
enlarged area. The merger would add
Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook coun-
ties to those already included in the
local district.

While there are many details yet to
be worked out, President Galloway ex-
pressed the belief that the merger
would result in a stronger organiza-
tion for both sections. He pointed out
that boys who have attended the Lost
lake camp for two or three years would
be unable to go to the Bend camp and
vice versa, should the joining be
effected.
