and the ease with which the recrea-  
tionist can get away for a day of sport.  
Soon you will see developed here in  
Hood River Valley some ski runners  
with a marvelous skill."

ruary 27, when a winter sports carnival  
will be staged at Swin, the local club  
will send a team.


