ABOVE THE CLOUDS IN LOCAL DISFAVOR

Hood River folk, who last week were privileged to preview "Above the Clouds," motion picture produced entirely in the Pacific northwest, with Mount Rainier forming a scenic background, failed to respond with any measure of enthusiasm. Walter Reece, of Seattle, producer and director of the picture, announced that he preferred to have the premiere showing of his screen drama unfold in a small town, in collaboration with Miss Lorraine Keeton, of Seattle, who also took the female lead, in a small town, residents of which, he declared, form the backbone of motion picture support.

"We chose Hood River," said Mr. Reece, "for the reason that this Oregon city, through the fame spread by its apples, has become the best known small town in the world."

Hood River residents responded in liberal numbers to the invitation of the producer. Monotony may be said to be a chief characteristic of the new picture. The only feature unfolding a good background story is gained through a projection of some of the glacial, snowfield and forest scenes of Rainier national park. Some of the mountaineering scenes, showing parties on route from Paradise to the summit, are extraordinarily good.

But for the human interest element in the picture, it is rapid. At no point does the spectator get a kick. Rather there is a wonderment if it is all about. There is no smoothness about the acting. Self-consciously the actors pose for their parts, and too often the spectator realizes that they are looking at the cameraman, instead of living the parts of a picture-drama.

Expression of regret, over the failure of the picture to measure up to expectations, was general. It was evident that a great deal of very sincere effort had been expended in fitting the production.

Hood River had a very kindly interest in the picture, for the reason that Miss Margaret Kissinger, daughter of Mr. E. Kissinger, played the part of a child's part. While her participation was more or less minor, it had an appeal that was above the average of others of the cast.

Miss Elizabeth McKim, in charge of publicity, for the producing company, stated before leaving Monday that the film will be taken to the laboratory and given a thorough going-over. Photographic defects will be eliminated, she said, and about 1200 feet will be cut, eliminating the monotony. She expressed the belief that this treatment along with a large number of subtitles, will make the picture more appealing.
