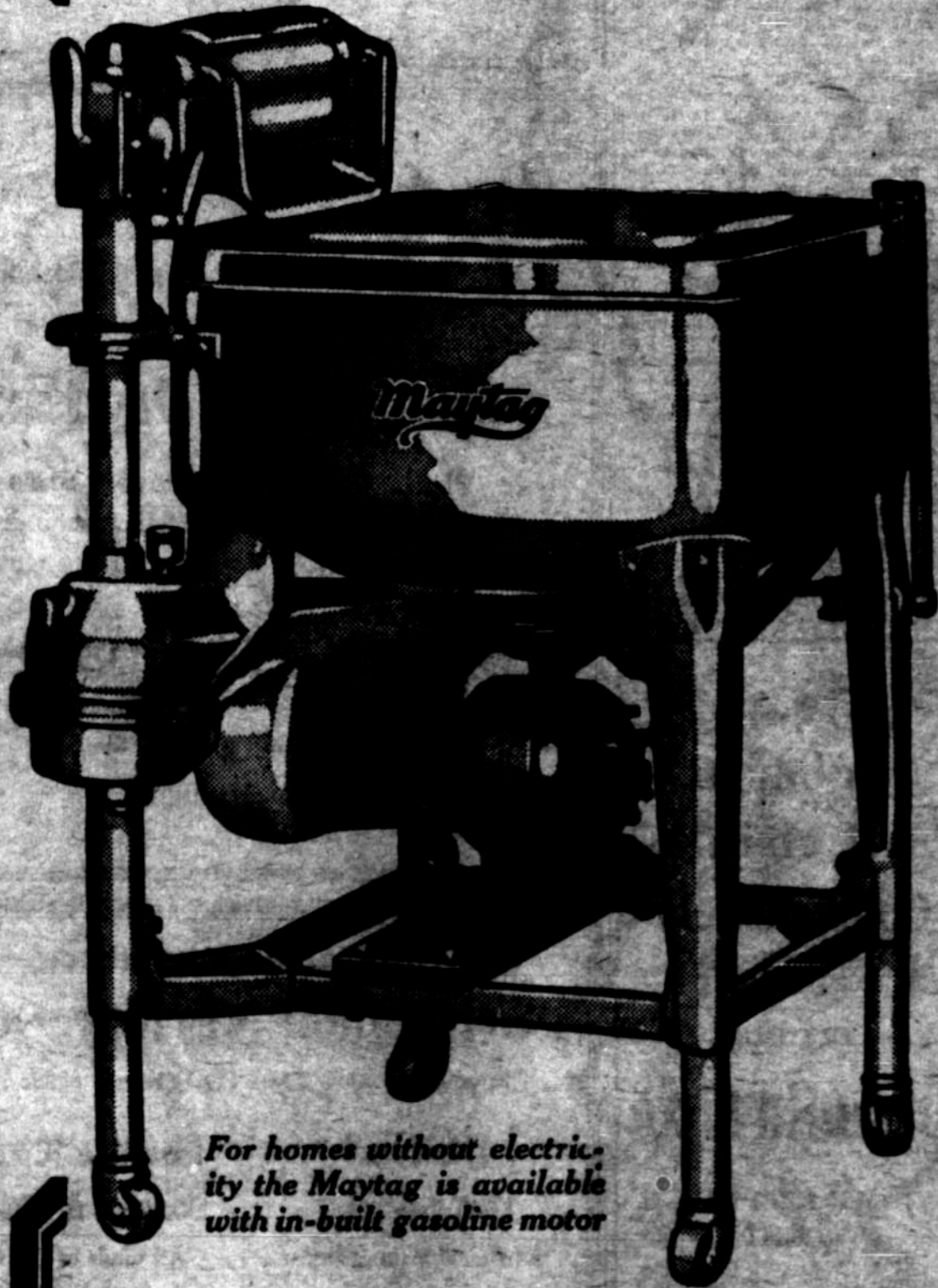

A. D. Moe said that he found Florida a pleasant place for one who likes a warm winter climate. He stated that while the Florida boom, which he characterized as more than a boom, a gigantic gamble had broken, the state remains in excellent financial condition with \$100,000,000 in the treasury.

"Florida will continue to forge ahead because of the climate and because of the fact that it is within 30 to 40 hours of 80 million people, who will go there to avoid the rigors of winter climate."

Mr. Moe said that Florida has some things that California cannot offer tourists—the warm climate—Miami is 700 miles south of Los Angeles—the excellent island and sea fishing and the warm water of the gulf stream for surf bathing. But California is a land of greater beauty and has a far greater appeal to Pacific coast people. Florida has little fertile land. Her tillers must be applied for production of crops.

On the Income Tax

Hood River, Ore., June 8, 1927.

Editor Glacier: Income tax question is now before the voters of Oregon. Being of great importance, I wish to share, briefly, some of the features included in the income tax law now to be acted on by the voters of the state of Oregon the 20th day of this June.

In the first place I believe it is a vicious law, and in harmony with the principles of justice and equity as it will be applied to the farmer and the wage earner; for, as I understand it, the law is intended to charge the farmer with the income tax, but not the farmer and

wage earner. If that is the case, it is self-evident that it is unjust. Not only is it unjust, but it is applied. It is applied. It is applied.

There are other features that will bring about more or less confusion and tax-dodging. Every person with an income anywhere near \$1,000 a year will necessarily have to keep his records of every expenditure of funds, even to a one-cent piece. There is always a way out of any difficulty.

An income tax on farmers will serve our purpose of a check in the state treasury. The farmers will not be able to pay the tax, and the state will be left with a very little, if any, income.

is better collected indirectly, than it directly. My sympathy goes out to the farmers and others who are in distress; but I do not think the proposed income tax law will furnish the needed relief, except at the expense of the farmer and wage earner.

I believe the only income tax law is unconstitutional and therefore void and nullification in every way.

The income tax law above referred to is a violation of the 10th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which states that no state shall be deprived of its property without just compensation.

If there is the least question about a person's income tax being paid in full, even to the cent, there will probably be a lot of difficulties running around over the state system on and getting into every taxpayer's private business to see if he has neglected to pay one dollar or two dollars or even five cents income tax.
