PROGRESS MADE IN SHIPPING CO-OP.

R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the Portland chamber of commerce, in a letter last week announced progress of Pacific northwest apple shippers and growers as follows:

"Since our last circular of May 23rd, the shippers have completed the organization, electing P. F. Clark, of Hood River, president, and Clifford White, of Wenatchee, secretary. "The only change we know of in their form of organization different from that reported in May 23rd is that the shippers have agreed to accept for membership in the different local shippers' organizations any grower who actually grows and markets as much as one hundred cars a year. "Since our last letter, the plan as agreed upon at the Seattle conference has been unanimously approved by the Agricultural Council and the Pacific Northwest Advisory Board as a whole, the latter having a membership of several hundred business men, and we hope this action may cause other business men in the different apple districts to take a more active interest in the organization of growers, which is the really big job to be done, because of the large territory to cover. "We have a letter from Lloyd S. Toney, chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture, in which he states they have decided to place a contact man from their department in the Pacific Northwest. "All organization work on the part of growers will be determined by the local committees. "We are advised that meetings will be held during this month in both the Yakima and Walla Walla districts to ascertain whether the growers are actually ready to sign up in the organization, they have approved, and we have mailed contracts to both these districts. "Whether or not it costs \$50,000 to organize the apple growers of the Northwest depends entirely upon the activities and interest of the growers themselves. "If men have to be employed to explain the details to each individual grower, \$50,000 will not do the job. "The expense of securing membership in cooperatives runs from \$3 to \$30 each, with a general average of about \$8. "This organization work will not go forward of its own accord. Somebody has to do it and if the grower does not do it himself he will have to pay somebody else for it. "The growers' organization committee has authorized and requested the State Chamber of Commerce of Washington to carry on the organization work and we understand that they expect to do so but will not give a definite decision until June 25th. "If any district wants grower contracts we will furnish them upon request of the local committee. "It is generally admitted that this movement has gone farther already than any other movement of the kind, and the question is now: Will it go forward or will all this work have to be done over again at some future time, at a cost of at least another \$10,000."

EXPLANATION OF MEASURE NO. 302

Measure No. 302 on the ballot for the special election to be held June 23 is a constitutional amendment which provides that the Portland School District may be restricted in its special tax levies as is every other school district in Oregon only by what is known as the 6% limitation amendment to the state constitution. The voters of the state of Oregon in 1910 passed an amendment to the constitution of the state which amendment provides that no tax levying body may levy a tax for one year which exceeds by more than 6% the tax levied the year previous. In 1917 the voters of Portland passed a school levy which was sufficient to meet the requirements of the Portland school district without levying the full amount permitted by the constitution. In accordance with this estimate the legislature enacted a law which limited the Portland school district to an annual six-mill tax levy, which two years later was increased to 6 1/2 mills. For the past several years this tax levy has been inadequate to meet the growing demands of the school district. In other words, the original estimate was too low to meet the increased demands for school funds brought about by a large increase in school population and the voters of Portland have year after year voted special taxes above those permitted by the limiting statutes. All other taxing units in Oregon are restricted in tax levies by the 6% constitutional amendment and the Portland school district is asking that its tax levies be restricted by the same general constitutional provision. The Dalles Cherry Bids Rejected
All bids for the 1927 canning cherry crop of The Dalles growers were rejected. It was announced by the board of directors Wednesday of last week after the bids were opened at a directors' meeting at the growers' office late Tuesday afternoon.

The Libby, McNeill & Libby company, formerly the Ray, Malling company of Hillsboro; and the Starr Fruit company of Portland, all submitted bids offering exactly the same prices, seven cents per pound for Royal Anas and Waterhouses, six cents for Montmorencies and five cents for Governor Woods. The Stadelman Fruit company offered eight cents for the Anas provided the growers would contract to that firm the entire black cherry crop at 12 cents. The directors refused to accept the contingent bid, as that was not what had been advertised. Bids covered about 100 tons of Anas and Waterhouses, 10 tons of Montmorencies and a small quantity of Governor Woods. This is about a quarter of the crop offered for sale last year, which was bid in at 9 1/2 cents for the bulk of the pick.
