BATTLE OF SIGNS STILL BEING WAGED

"The Battle of Signs," waged by factions of motorists and business folk on Cascade avenue, and Oak street, both of which carry Columbia River highway traffic across the city, continues. Formerly Cascade avenue was the only paved thoroughfare across the city, and the busy Highway Commission originally designated this street as the official route for the highway. Last year, however, Oak street, which parallels Cascade to the south and then cuts into the highway obliquely west of town, was paved. Oak street forms a direct way through town, passes through the main business section and eliminates several right angle turns. The highway department this spring designated Oak street as the official street to carry Columbia River highway traffic.

Last year Oak street business interests secured the use of roadside property and erected a large sign which declared Oak street as the direct route through town. The Cascade interests have now retaliated with a larger sign, ornate and handsomely painted, which directs traffic to Cascade avenue. "Take the Left Road," says the sign, and underneath appears in huge lettering, "Columbia River Highway." In between the two extraordinary large captions appear two words, both in minute type, "to old." The Cascade avenue faction declare their sign truthful, but one must walk at a slow pace by the signboard before he will ever notice the small lettering referring to the old road.

CHERRY HARVEST TO START ABOUT JULY 1

Harvest of the cherry crop here will begin about July 1. The tonnage this season will be a little less than 60 per cent of last year, when 22 cars were shipped. The Apple Growers Association is expecting 30 cars this year.

The quality of the crop this year is fine. The fruit was thinned by the cold weather prevailing at blossoming, and the cherries will be of extraordinary size. High prices are expected. Numerous inquiries are already being received from the east and middle west, where the fruit is marketed in 10-pound boxes.

QUARANTINE ORDER NO. 4
Pertaining to the Cherry Fruit Fly

The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture that an injurious insect pest of the cherry, the cherry fruit fly (*Rhagoletis cingulata*), exists in and is widely distributed throughout the state of Oregon, Lane, Linn, Benton, Polk, Marion, Clatsop, Clackamas, Multnomah, Washington, Columbia and Union, state of Oregon, heretofore designated as infested territory and that all fresh fruit of the cherry and boxes that have contained the fresh fruit of the cherry are liable to be carriers of said pest.

Now, therefore, I, Chas. A. Park, President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, under the authority conferred by section 2 of chapter 240 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1915 and section 4 of chapter 543 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1915 consider it necessary, in order to further prevent the spread of the cherry fruit fly (*Rhagoletis cingulata*), within the state of Oregon, do hereby quarantine the said infested territory and from and after the publication of this order in three newspapers published within the state of Oregon, it shall be unlawful for any person or corporation to carry or transport any fresh cherries or boxes that have contained fresh cherries from said infested territory into any other locality of the state of Oregon except as hereinafter provided.

1. Fresh cherries shall not be carried or transported from said infested territory at any time into the counties of Hood River, Wasco, and Umatilla unless accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, certifying that all of the cherries in said shipment were dipped in boiling water or subjected to live steam in a closed container for a period of two minutes, and that said boxes are free from all fruit, leaves and twigs of the cherry.

2. Nothing in this order shall be construed to prohibit the transportation of fresh cherries or lug boxes or other containers of fresh cherries into county in the quarantined area, or into such other counties of the state of Oregon not mentioned in this order, or through the counties of Hood River, Wasco and Umatilla.
