Regardless of the fact the fall has been rainy, it is still desirable to apply the full Bordeaux where this was not used as a summer spray or in combination with the oil this spring. The Station recommends the 6-50 formula, preferring the dissolving of the crystals at this time rather than the use of the powdered Bluestone as cold weather makes it rather difficult to dissolve it properly. Do not neglect young trees especially.

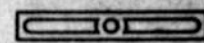

THE STAR GROCERY IS 20 YEARS OLD

The Star Grocery of Perigo & Son will celebrate its 20th birthday anniversary next week. The grocery store was opened in the location now occupied on October 21, 1907. It has sold the best of groceries to Hood River folk at this stand the entire 20 years, except for three months in 1917, when the building was destroyed by fire. During that time the store occupied a portion of a building which was replaced by the Butler Banking Company structure.

As soon as a modern new store was completed, the Star Grocery removed to the old stand.

As an historic interlude, two decades do not form more than an exclamation point, but J. W. Perigo and R. B. Perigo, his son, have witnessed many changes in Hood River. W. A. Morgan, now a Portland business man and brother of Fire Marshal L. G. Morgan, was the only clerk in the store when it was opened. He had charge of the deliveries. Patrons in those days could have their goods sent up at any time of the day. Mr. Morgan drove a team of horses, and they frequently furnished The Glacier of those days with interesting runaway items. Indeed, they ran away so frequently that it became news when a week passed and they remained tractable.

When the fire bell sounded in those days the city's delivery men fled with each other in a race to the fire house, in order to see whose horses would drag the old two-wheeled horse cart and a chemical engine to the blaze. Mr. Morgan's team stood high in the winning stakes. An automobile was first used for deliveries in 1915.

The Perigos came to Hood River direct from Booneville, Ind., where they had formerly been in mercantile business. Today they have one of the outstanding service grocery concerns in Oregon. In addition to the owners, the personnel of the store today is: E. B. Samuel, A. F. Cooper, George Knox, W. B. Gibson and George Sammel, the latter deliveryman. All of the employees have long been with the firm.
