Opens Real Estate Office.

J. B. Laber, owner of the Cascade Locks townsite, is erecting a 2-story building at the lower end of Main street, next door to the Cascade Food store, which he will occupy as a real estate office. The upper floor is to be given over to a one-family apartment. William Keeler, Cascade Locks agent for Mr. Laber, in charge of real estate, will have quarters in the new building. However, he will not utilize all of the lower floor, a large room of which will be for rent. Several applications for the ground floor have been received. With the opening of an office Mr. Laber expects to be in position to show prospective purchasers the residential and business properties of the townsite without delay. Inquiries for properties are increasing steadily as word of Cascade Locks' growth spreads out over the coast.

Bank to Serve Locks.

The Bank of Stevenson, across the river, is preparing to extend banking service to Cascade Locks insofar as state banking laws will permit.

Through its president, George F. Christensen, the bank has announced that it will cash payroll checks and take care of other banking needs in Cascade Locks. However, the statutes prohibit it from designating a receiving station for deposits on this side of the river and it will not attempt to carry its services that far.

The Stevenson bank is the only bank in Skamania county. It remained open throughout the banking holiday, and now with the federal law which guarantees individual deposits up to \$2500 in a strong position. There is no other bank this side of Hood River and the 5000 people who live in a 10-mile radius of the Bridge of the Gods are finding it convenient to carry on their banking business with it.
