MEN'S COMFORT FIRST CONCERN OF E. F. KAISER

Columbia People to Emphasize Humanitarian Principle in Building Bunkhouses at Bonneville Dam

Your reporter sat in the outer office of the Columbia Construction, Portland, waiting to see Edgar F. Kaiser, administrative manager for his company, contractors who have been awarded the main contract for the spillway dam at Bonneville. This contract amounts to nearly 10 millions of dollars, the largest in the Lewis Building company, in the Lewis Building and will require three years time to complete.

What type of a man was given such an Herculean task as being the administrative head of such a big job? This was the question your reporter asked himself as he

awaited an interview. A newly installed telephone switch board in the outer office was buzzing constantly. Most of the incoming calls asked for Mr. Kaiser—and he answered every call personally. Once inside Mr. Kaiser's office I found a quiet, kindly faced young man, with eyes that sparkle with humor, yet one who knows construction problems as you or I know our ABC's. His entire attention is given to you, and to your mission with him, was the way he impressed me, yet surely, in the back part of that active brain of his, he must have been revolving some of the many complex problems concerning his company's contract at Bonneville.

Mr. Kaiser seems to think in terms of the humanitarian side of the business, rather than the dollars and cents side. Once started talking, he explained his company advocated the best living quarters possible to be built for the men in their employ. He said these houses should be double constructed, steam heated, running water in every house. "We may have a severe winter next year, and if we do, these men must have adequate living quarters," he explained. "Certainly, such construction will cost more money, but those men work hard and are entitled to the best there is."
