Debt Cut \$40,000. in Year.

Eugene—Lane county's war-
rant indebtedness has been reduced
from \$168,415.42 to \$128,492.37
in the past year, according to the
semi-annual statement of
County Treasurer Grace Schiska.
The treasurer has \$122,492.62
cash on hand, but some of this
is allotted to other funds and may
not be used to retire warrants.

Big Gold Brick Shipped.

Baker—A gold brick weighing
84½ ounces was shipped to the
mint through the First National
bank here last week. The gold
represented the cleanup of a six-
day run of the Condor gold mines,
operating in the Mormon basin
district. At \$30 an ounce the
brick was valued at \$2535. A 72
ounce brick was brought to the
bank from the Pioneer dredge on
Clark's creek this week.

Government Starts Work

On New Bonneville School

Workmen commenced turning
dirt Tuesday on the new \$15,000
school which the federal govern-
ment is building on the Hill at
Bonneville. The work is being car-
ried on under direction of Inspec-
tor Warren K. Dunn.

The new school building prom-
ises to be one of the finest in the
state of Oregon. It will be heated
from a central heating plant, will
have three rooms and provide ac-
commodations for all the children
tributary to Bonneville between
the Hood River county line and
Dodson.

Work is being rushed on the
building in order that it may be
ready for use early in September.

RECREATIONAL CENTER

TO BE OPENED AT DAM

Awarding of a contract for con-
struction of a recreational center
at Bonneville only awaits final ap-
proval of plans by the war de-
partment.

The Columbia Construction
company and a company known
as the Bonneville Community Cen-
ter, Inc., bid on the concession.
Indications are that the concession
will be given to the Bonneville
Community Center, Inc. This
company is organized for the ex-
press purpose of handling the con-
cession and is headed by Loiron
Solon, Portland.

Plans provide for a general
store, theater, pool hall, barber
shop, shoe shop and probably a
beer spot. The project is expected
to cost \$25,000.

New Pastor Arrives to

Fill Bonneville Pulpit

Rev. Stanley Trefern of Scholls
has been appointed minister at
Bonneville to fill the pulpit at the
Community church. His salary is
being underwritten by the Port-
land Council of Churches, which
has been interested for some
months in providing religious ser-
vices for the district.

The new pastor has arrived in
Bonneville and is now making his
home at Eagle creek. He will fill
the pulpit at the morning and eve-
ning services Sunday. Sunday
school is being held regularly
every Sunday morning.

In addition to his work at Bon-
neville, the Rev. Mr. Trefern will
also hold services for the Triple
"C" camps at Wahkeena in the
new Benson park and at Wyeth.

New Subdivision.

Opening of a new subdivision on
the highway at the Columbia fox
farm, near Dodson, has been an-
nounced by Victor Mardon, finan-
cial agent, with headquarters in
the Park building, Portland.

The owners of the property, a
small company, propose to handle
acreage and lots and may establish
a business district, with a grocery
store, a filling station, beer spot
and card room.

There is talk of another subdivi-
sion being opened at Warren-
dale, but as yet no public an-
nouncement has been made of pro-
posed plans.

tion near the administration build-
