BONNEVILLE

Carpenters are putting the finishing touches on the new quarters which are being built for accommodation of the United States guards at the dam. There are 21 members of the police force. They have occupied a single building for months, but it is not large enough to permit all to sleep under one roof. The new barracks is the same dimensions and style as the original building and stands next door to it.

Work of bringing the ground throughout the reservation up to a standard grade is being pushed forward in an effort to complete the job before autumn rains set in.

The grade has reached the road built last spring from the entrance gate to the Community house and a new road has been laid down.

The ground surrounding the new homes is being filled and surplus dirt is being stacked up for use following completion of the water and sewer system, which are being installed.

Plans are being prepared for a Union Pacific railroad station which will be erected on the reservation after the task of shifting the railroad tracks is finished.

Details of the style and size of the station have not been made public, but the site has been tentatively selected. The building will stand east of the road that leads down into the reservation, at a point near the spot where thousands of tons of rock have been stacked up for use as facing the side of Ruckel slide.
