OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Brief Resumé of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers

McMinnville—Frank W. Fenton of McMinnville offered to donate to the government a site for the new McMinnville postoffice. He will retain an adjoining piece of property.

Albany — Destructive rodents totaling 3798 have been killed in Linn county since May 20. Of this total there were 1747 mice, 1214 gray diggers, 231 gophers, 261 moles, 179 rats and 22 jack-rabbits.

The Dalles—The project of the state highway commission to expend \$80,000 at The Dalles did a-borning when business men on 2nd street protested against the improvement of that street, the main business street.

Hillsboro — Believe it or not, there is no dissatisfaction in Washington county with the administration of relief. Three times the county relief committee has called for complaints, but none has been presented.

Elgin — Mrs. Anna Hug, who celebrated her 98th birthday last June at her home in Elgin, is dead after having been in a coma most of the time for many months. She came to the Grande Ronde valley from Utah in 1878.

Eugene — Two hundred and fifty young Chinese pheasants from the state game farm at Eugene are now being kept in the holding pens erected by Yamhill county sportsmen on land within the game reserve in Scoggins valley.

Hood River—The heavy winds of last week in Hood River valley, while they protected apples from sun scald, took a heavy toll of Anjou pears. In the more exposed orchards as high as 40 per cent. were torn from the trees in the lower valley.

Eugene Near Cash Basis

Eugene — The city lacks less than three months in being on a cash basis in its general fund. It was announced by Fred Wentworth, city treasurer. The treasurer has called in all warrants on this fund up to May 25. More taxes will be coming in later in the month and it is expected that the fund will be even closer to a cash basis by fall.

State Gets Park Tract

Salem—Mrs. George W. Joseph and son George Jr., of Portland, have deeded to the state highway commission a 40-acre tract of land on the Columbia highway for use as a state park. The tract adjoins the Latourral park and its attractiveness is enhanced by a beautiful falls. The park will be improved under the direction of the state highway department.

Honey Golf Balls

The uses to which honey is put are many and various, but perhaps the most unusual is in making golf balls. The honey is placed in a round stout rubber sac and is forced in under tremendous pressure. Around this the usual rubber is wound and it has the ordinary outside. It is said that honey being non-evaporable and virtually unaffected by time or temperature gives a ball that stands up under all conditions.

Books Classified as Silk

Book lovers in England are protesting against a new ruling of the customs department that imported books whose bindings are lined with silk or have bookmarks of silk ribbon should be classified as silk, and the silk duty charged. One bibliophile has publicly asked if books bound in calf shall be quarantined and taxed as herds.
