To Discuss Fishways.

Army engineers have called a meeting for Monday in Portland, where they will hear both sides to the controversy which is being carried on between the state fish commission and the U. S. bureau of hatcheries over the proper system to use in getting salmon over Bonneville dam.

The federal bureau wants hydraulic lifts, while the state fish commission insists on five gravity fishways or runways at the dam.

It has been suggested by the state that a canal be taken out of the river up toward the head of Bradford island and brought down through the reservation to a point below the fish hatchery.

Stewart Released on Bail.

A. L. Stewart is out on bail and home again after having been held in custody at Hood River, where he was given a preliminary hearing in circuit court on a perjury charge following his indictment by the grand jury.

The indictment was returned after Stewart had offered an alleged bill of sale, purported to have been signed by his wife, in the trial that grew out of the quarrel between himself and Thad Glazier, owner of the Texaco service station and garage, over possession of the property which is part of the Mrs. Stewart holdings.

Glazier claimed a 5-year lease from Mrs. Stewart. The case was heard before Judge Fred Wilson, who ruled in favor of Glazier and took the position that the bill of sale was fraudulent.

Eimer Builds More Houses.

Jack Eimer, the electrician, is building another house in the Hyde park district and proposes to put up three more in the same neighborhood. These houses will contain three rooms each and be fitted up in a modern way with plumbing and electricity.
