**NATIONAL FOREST NEWS**

**BONNEVILLE DAM WORK CAUSES FIRE HAZARD**

Many of the men employed on the Bonneville dam project, not wanting to live in the main camps near their work, have leased or purchased small tracts of land along the Columbia River highway near Bonneville and constructed temporary homes. Many of these homes are built on steep hillsides near the boundary of the Mt. Hood national forest. In many cases the land had to be cleared of logs and brush, and these slashings are now in large piles near their homes. Owing to present fire weather hazards it is impossible to permit the burning of these piles of slash. Many of these people come from cities and do not realize the danger of fire.

During the past two weeks forest rangers have been kept busy responding to small fires caused by cigarettes or trash blazes fires near these homes, reports the forest ranger at Eagle creek.

Last week Albert Wiesendanger, forest ranger at Eagle creek station, discovered a serious slash fire burning unattended within 50 feet of the new residence of Henry M. Mason, an engineer employed on the dam. A crew of ten CCC boys prevented the spread of the fire until a forest service fire truck arrived with 1500 gallons of water when the fire was extinguished.

About this time Mr. and Mrs. Mason returned home, and both stated they had set a fire near one

of the piles of slash to burn some garbage, but thought the fire was out before they left home. Mr. Mason was arrested by Ranger Wiesendanger on a charge of a building a fire in closed season without first obtaining a permit from a fire warden or forest officer. Mason plead guilty before Judge Astman of Gresham and was fined \$25.

Emergency fire patrol has been placed by District Ranger Wang along the Columbia River highway and the main trails leading from the highway. The Gorge is very smoky and fire lookouts are unable to see very far.

**Deer Season**—Owing to lack of definite information concerning the migratory waterfowl, the Oregon state game commission has been unable to supply forest rangers with official hunting synopsis, since none have been printed.

However, those who are planning their vacations during deer season may be interested in knowing that the deer season opens on September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two Columbian blacktail deer or one mule deer, with requirement that both deer tags be affixed to the mule deer.

**Grouse and Native Pheasants**—Open season (sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasants) October 15 to October 31, both dates inclusive. These dates also apply to China pheasants.

**Fines**—\$75 fine for throwing away lighted tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, matches or other lighted material on any forest land, private road, public highway or railroad right of way within the state of Oregon.

Also \$25 fine for failure to secure a burning permit to burn trash, garbage, slash, etc., between May 15 and October 1. These permits cost nothing and may be had through the forest rangers at Eagle creek or Columbia Gorge ranger stations.

**Telephone Service Growing.**

Demand for telephone service in Cascade Locks continues to grow. The number of phones in use has doubled since last October and has now reached the point where it is possible to call quite a number of families and business houses. The nickle toll rate to Bonneville permits users to get reasonable extensive service.
