Fish Ladders Opposed.
The fish commissions of Oregon and Washington will have the support of sportsmen of the two states in the fight now being made against current plans for carrying salmon over the dam.

At a meeting Wednesday in Portland the sportsmen and commissioners asked the government to install a fishway, which will lead the salmon upstream by easy stages. Engineers have had in mind a type of ladder which state authorities insist is an untried experiment.
