STATE SHOULD ACT.

Lord Northcliffe, the famous English publisher, used to say that Americans were the most patient people in the world. And the most patient of all patient Americans live in Cascade Locks. Proof of this may be observed daily by the visitors who have occasion to use the state highway, which forms the main business artery of the town.

Long months ago the state highway department purchased a right-of-way through the business district with the avowed intention of widening and straightening the road and taking the grades out of it.

Two months ago the state obtained federal funds with which to improve highways. An allocation of \$50,000 was made to Cascade Locks. But the "Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away." The \$50,000 was withdrawn and is to be spent on a new highway which will link Portland to the coast by a new route.

The state has dilly dallied and done nothing toward improving the highway from the bridge to the Craigmont hotel. And indications are that it will do nothing until the town demands action. Improvement of the road rests with the state. Perhaps a delegation of business men can shame the highway department into fulfilling its obligation. Under any circumstances the presence of a delegation at the capital can do no harm and might do much good.

CANCEL THE INTEREST.

Associated Press dispatches bring the information that the next national convention of the American Legion will forego a demand for immediate cash payment of the bonuses due to the veterans.

This will not surprise veterans, for neither the conservative republican political leaders nor the present administration at Washington want to be worried with another bonus campaign.

But to ignore a wrong does not right it. The veterans have been long suffering and have not complained more than is the custom of soldiers. However, they observe the interest on loans obtained on their insurance policies growing steadily year after year, and many of them are coming to the realization that unless the policies are paid off in cash that there will be nothing left at due date.

The government may not be in a position to cash the bonuses after having spilled billions of dollars on this and that, but it can, and should forego the interest which it is charging veterans who were forced to borrow money.

If the national convention of the American Legion does not demand the cash bonus it is to be hoped that the organization will request congress to cease taking the pound of flesh.
