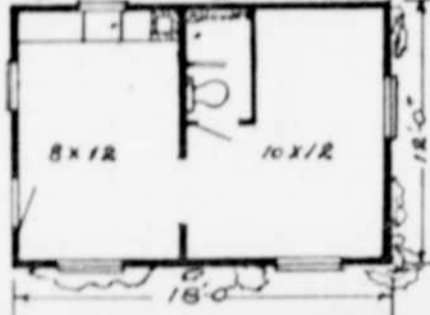
**Steal World War Plaque**
