

**JAY UPTON TO SPEAK AT
HIGH SCHOOL TONIGHT**

Jay H. Upton, who wants to represent the third congressional district in congress, is going to speak tonight at the high school. The Chronicle wishes everyone who lives between Eagle creek and Wyeth could hear him. And it also wishes with equal force that all in the same territory can hear Walter Pierce when he comes along to claim the public ear.

One of the two men will sit in Washington for the next two years helping to make laws, pass upon appropriations, determining governmental policies.

The depression of 192 is attributed to many causes, but in the final analysis it may be charged to indifference of the people in public affairs. Nigger rich and pleasure bent the public permitted the administration of government to fall into the hands of organized groups, who ran it for their own benefit—and this was true in national, state, county and local affairs. As a result of this indifference the community has no member on the county board, and the management of its schools is directed by a group of men who live in the Hood river valley.

Principles of the American government are sound, but they are often criticized by men and women who refuse to participate in politics—and politics is the keystone to the American system. It places responsibility upon the people. That is what makes choice of a congressman more important than a card party.
