FOREST SERVICE NEWS

Eagle creek picnic grounds continue to attract a large number of picnickers. Last Sunday every available space for parking cars was occupied and all tables were in use. This is very unusual for this late in the season. The warm weather and the news items regarding the construction and progress of the Bonneville dam project is evidently responsible for this continued use of the grounds as many visitors continue to motor to Bonneville to inspect the project.

Burning permits are no longer required for trash fires. However, this being fire prevention week home owners should inspect their homes before the cold weather sets in and make sure their chimney is clean. Cold weather may set in and overheated flues may cause fire. Electric wires entering the building should be inspected to make sure falling branches from trees have not stretched them so they will contact with one another. A safe place for hot ashes should be provided. Make sure you have the proper fuse plugs in your switch box. Clean out all trash and old rags from the basement or near the stove or furnace. These are all suggestions in the interest of fire prevention.

A detail from Benson Park CCC camp continues to assist Ranger Wiesendanger in constructing new camp stoves, drinking fountains, falling dangerous snags and bucking them into wood for free use of the picnickers. They expect to complete their job list by November 1, when the Benson Park CCC camp will be moved to its winter quarters at Newport.

Before cutting any trees along the Columbia river highway for fuel home owners should first get permission from the owner of the land. If the timber is on national forest land call at the Columbia Gorge or Eagle creek ranger station and consult the forest ranger in order that you will not commit a timber trespass.

One of the major fire protection projects in this district was recently completed with the joining of the Larch mountain and Oak Grove roads. This road takes in Larch Mountain, Indian Mountain, Wahtum Lake and Oak Grove, which is out of Hood River. From this main road, spurs run off down past Tanner butte to Dublin Lake.

Another branch runs out to the Nesmith lookout station. The road from Kingsley's ranch, out of Hood River to the Green Point lookout station, is to be improved. This main road runs through the Bull Run reserve for quite a distance, so will not be open to general traffic but will be maintained for protection purposes.

Shelters have been built on Larch Mountain—one at the summit and one at the spring. This work was done by the CCC boys, who also improved and cleaned up the camp grounds.

The Latourell CCC camp is moving to its winter quarters about the 15th of this month. The new camp will be at Camp Willark near St. Helens. The Weyth camp will also move around the 15th to Gold Beach, Oregon.
