Origin of Word "Bank"

The origin of the word bank as the place of business of money dealers is obscure, says Literary Digest. In that use the first appearance of the word in English was in the last quarter of the Fifteenth century. Etymologists believe it to have been derived from the earlier banca (banck, bannk, bancke, banke, as alternate spellings), meaning bench or shelf, a sense that traces back in English to the Eleventh century.

Largest Roman Forum

The largest Roman forum is at Salamis, on the island of Cyprus. Five miles away, at Famagusta, in one of the town's fortifications, stands Othello's Tower, where Desdemona met her tragic end. To the southeast stands Limasol, where Richard the Lion Hearted married Berengaria, and there she was crowned Queen of England.

Where States Meet

At Harper's Ferry three states meet and the Shenandoah and Potomac rivers join. John Brown's raid on the United States arsenal in 1857 was in this town, and it was in a state of almost constant siege during the Civil war.

Our Early Trade Routes Along Navigable Rivers

The early trade routes followed navigable rivers and Indian trails, notes a writer in the Washington Star. Communication between the different colonies was chiefly by water and between the three populous centers of the North—Boston, New York and Philadelphia. Roads developed slowly—as late as the Revolution there were only three routes north and east of New York, and only one leading west from Philadelphia. To the south two rude trails led across mountains—one at Harpers Ferry and the other through Cumberland Gap. Progress was more rapid in New England.

As early as 1639 the state of Massachusetts ordered each town to construct a highway with the adjoining town. The roads of Colonial New England followed roughly the routes of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad.

In the South, an excellent system of waterways navigable during the entire year because of mild climate, furnished the best means of transportation and delayed the building of roads until the middle of the Eighteenth century.
