"The Mall"
 "Mall" was originally the name of the mallet used in playing pall-mall, a game played in France, Scotland, and England hundreds of years ago in which a ball was driven with a mallet. By extension, "mall" was applied to the game itself, as well as to the place where it was played. Thus Pall-Mall, a famous street in London, received its name from the fact that it was formerly a pall-mall alley. In the course of time "mall" came to mean a public walk, especially a shaded one. "The Mall" is applied to a strip of land in Washington, D. C. lying between the Capitol and the Washington monument, bounded on the east by the Capitol grounds, on the south by Maryland avenue and B street S. W., on the west by Seventeenth street, and on the north by Pennsylvania avenue and B street N. W. The name is also applied to a Cleveland strip of land.
