"Red" Jennings is calling the first basketball turnout of the season for Tuesday, October 23, at 7 p. m. at the Cascade Locks high school gym. Everyone who has played or would like to play is urged to be present. A heavy schedule has been arranged. Plans are under way for a local league which will include about eight teams. Two of the construction companies have already signified their intention of entering teams. Others from the reservation, Stevenson and Cascade Locks will complete the league.

Supt. Henderson of the Cascade Locks high school has offered the facilities of the high school gym and will put up a cup for the winner.

One team will be selected from all the teams entered from the reservation to represent the dam area in the Portland league.

CONTRACTORS START WORK ON BUNKHOUSES

Dugan & Hammond, Portland contractors, set a crew of men to work Monday building a group of 17 bunkhouses in the camp established by Orin, Bell & Malcom, contractors on the Union Pacific railroad removal job.

The camp is located just east of the new Bonneville school and will be ready for occupancy within three weeks. The bunkhouses are of frame construction, 18x38 feet, and will accommodate 204 men, with 12 men to each unit. Separate buildings are being erected to house the bath house, dining room and kitchen. The contract for feeding the men has been awarded to the National Commissary company.

Reports have persisted that Fred Meyer would operate a grocery and drug store, but he appears now to be out of the picture and it is said the several lines of business to be housed in the new building will be privately owned.

The property will be ready for occupancy November 15, and the picture show will be ready to operate at that time. It will be under direction of J. J. Parker, owner of the Broadway and other Portland theaters.
