Hedgehog and Porcupine Are Entirely Different

A common error is to confuse the hedgehog and the porcupine. The hedgehog is by no means the same, although there are similar characteristics. The hedgehog is a small animal, the largest being about the size of a large rat. They do have spines mixed in with the fur on their back and those so protected by nature, roll up in balls when attacked, after the manner of a porcupine. They feed largely on insects, mice and eggs. About nineteen varieties are known to exist in Great Britain, Europe and Asia.

The porcupine of the North American continent is a far larger animal, weighing as much as 35 and 40 pounds. Their quills or spines cover the head and back and the tail as well.

The porcupine is largely a vegetarian, feeding on bark and certain leaves. As food it is considered highly appetizing and in most sections it is considered a boon to hunters. It affords a food reserve for those unfortunate enough to be lost without ammunition. The porcupine seldom hurries and when approached by an enemy rolls up with a sense of security. It is easily killed with a club and for that reason hunters are inclined to let the porcupine live excepting in cases of emergency.—Washington Star.

Murder of Famous Chief Resulted in Many Deaths

One of the most inexcusable murders in the history of our contact with the Red race, cites a writer in the Cleveland (Ohio) Plain Dealer, was the killing of the famous Chief-tain Cornstalk. Having gone to the American camp at Point Pleasant in West Virginia on a friendly visit to bring about peace between the two races, he was held prisoner by the officers. While thus detained, a prowling Indian in the vicinity killed a white man. The soldiers, hearing this, rushed upon Cornstalk—also his son Ellinpsico and Black Hawks, who were imprisoned there—and in revenge cruelly murdered them. This destroyed the only hope of reconciliation and peace between the white settlers south of the Ohio river and the Indian tribes north of it. Occurring in 1777, this was followed by a succession of wars, forays, and murders down to the battle of Fallen Timbers in 1794, during which many thousands of white men, women and children, and many thousands of the Red race perished at each other's hands, all of which might have been averted by peace had not the beloved Cornstalk been murdered.

The Variation

Variation means change, and when a piece of music is called an air and variation it means that the composer has rung the changes in different ways on a tune of his own, or somebody else's, melody.

When keyed instruments first appeared variations were very popular. At first they were trilleries and ornaments attached to the air. Then little note patterns came along, and eventually the tune was dressed in all kinds of ways—sometimes in dance rhythm, sometimes in stately measure. Often a variation would bring out a sad feeling in the melody. Beethoven wrote as many as 32 on his own original tune. Bach and Brahms loved making variations.

Famous Russian Library

The famous and magnificent state library at Leningrad which was founded in 1814 and early became one of the great treasure houses of the world has not lost much of its magnificence and value since the revolution. It still contains most of the valuable collections for which it was noted, including Voltaire's library, which was bought intact by Catherine II, many of the most celebrated copies of the Bible and the Koran, rare Hebrew manuscripts of the Pentateuch and the famous Codex Sinaiticus, which next to the one in the Vatican, is the oldest Greek manuscript in existence of the New Testament, having been found in an ancient monastery on Mount Sinai.

Rattlesnakes' Fangs Are Like Hypodermic Needles

The poisonous fangs of rattlesnakes look very much like harmless teeth growing one on each side of the top of the upper jaw, but a drop or two of the deadly venom is usually death to the victim, says a writer in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

The fangs are sharp as needles and behind them are the little cups that hold the poison. The whole arrangement works with the swift effectiveness of a hypodermic needle. The fangs puncture the skin of the victim and the poison cups empty their deadly liquid.

Their young are born alive, instead of being hatched from eggs, as the young of most snakes are. And, instead of being born in spring, in the north they're born in the autumn, and the poor baby snakes starve all winter, but the little banded rattlers live so listlessly deep down among the rocks that they don't seem to need food.

The old tale that you can cut a snake in two pieces and its tail won't stop wiggling until sundown is a "fish story." But there is one thing about a rattlesnake which is almost as remarkable as the yarn about the living tail—and that is the indestructible nature of its poison fangs.

You can cut out these terrible weapons, but if you think you've disarmed the old rattler, you're mistaken. For he simply pushes out a new pair of fangs, just as sharp, just as deadly, as the first. You can cut off this pair, and there will come another, for the wily old snake keeps a long row of fangs in reserve.

The Great Horned Owl

The great horned owl is one member of the owl family that can be classed as predatory, for the reason that a considerable portion of its diet consists of desirable small game species such as grouse, quail and rabbits. Yet in spite of this it also hunts gophers, red squirrels, mice and rats. This owl is one of the largest birds of prey and is endowed with an uncanny lack of fear.

Height of Hemlock Trees

The hemlock commonly attains a height of about 75 feet and a trunk diameter of 2 to 3 feet. Very old trees in good soil may reach up 100 feet and attain a diameter of 5 to 6 feet. The hemlock is a sturdy tree. It is valuable for lumber and an important source of wood pulp. The bark is extensively used in tanneries.
