The Yakimas want burial ground on the Washington side, but the Umatillas and Warm Springs want to establish a burial ground on the Oregon side in the neighborhood of Cascade Locks.

ROOSEVELT TO PUT ON FIGHT CARDS AT DAM

Boxing bouts and wrestling matches that will rival any card on the coast are soon to be held at the Roosevelt theatre on the reservation, according to Ted Gamble of the J. J. Parker theatres. These major attractions are to be supported by local talent.

Fred Merrill, Portland, long associated with professional sports, has been named matchmaker. Merrill plans on drawing from all stables of fighters, rather than confine himself to one group.

The first card has been tentatively set for Friday, January 18. Merrill says he will not sponsor a mixed card. In other words it will be all wrestling or all boxing. If the patronage warrants, two shows a week will be put on, Tuesday and Friday.

Any local talent in the way of boxers, wrestlers or referees is asked to leave his name and address at the box office in the theatre.

"We are anxious to give them of the dam the finest entertainment possible at prices within reason. If we receive the response from the men we hope to, there is no telling who we may bring out," Merrill stated.

The prices will be modeled after the regular prices in Portland.

Paper-Making Industry Started in China, Japan

The art of making paper appears to have been known to the Chinese and Japanese from very early times. It was kept a secret for several centuries by the Chinese, but at the end of the Seventh century, as the result of a raid by Moors and Arabs, the secret was wrested from them and imparted to their captors, says the Indianapolis News. Paper mills were established in Bagdad in 755 A. D. and for 500 years the industry was maintained as a state monopoly. About the Twelfth century paper making was introduced by the Moors into Spain, whence it spread to Italy, and later to France, Switzerland and Holland, attaining a high degree of excellence in the last-named country. It was not well established in England till 1685. The first paper mill in America was erected near Philadelphia in 1690. Until the beginning of the Nineteenth century every sheet of paper had to be made laboriously by hand.

The credit of introducing a successful paper-making machine belongs to Henry and Sealey Fourdrinier, who, interested by a French printer, Nicholas Robert, and assisted by Bryan Donkin, turned out, in 1803, the machine which bears their name. The first cylinder machine was put into practical operation by John Dickenson, in England in 1800. In 1821 drying cylinders were added to the Fourdrinier machine, which up to this time had contained no drying apparatus.
