The lease is reported to have been made to the Roosevelt Holding company. Work of moving in furniture will be started this week. The hotel will not have a dining room, but a coffee shop is being opened in the building.

Winnipeg, City of Furs, Is Capital of Manitoba

In 1875 the little community of Winnipeg, Manitoba, which had grown up at the site of the old Hudson bay trading post of Fort Garry was granted incorporation under the name of Winnipeg. In 1870 Winnipeg had already been created capital of the newly organized province of Manitoba. At that date the population was estimated at about 300, but in 1881 Winnipeg had a population of 218,755, not including the adjacent city of St. Boniface and surrounding suburbs outside the city boundaries.

Early fur traders selected the spot where the Assiniboine River flows into the Red as a strategic place for their trading operations. Later, when the Canadian Pacific railroad was built, it crossed the Red river at Winnipeg, and the city's future as a great trading center was assured. It has become one of the greatest railway centers on the continent. Although considered a northern city, it is in a latitude south of the southernmost tip of the British Isles, far south of Berlin, and not much north of Paris.
