

The Roosevelt theater will open Wednesday night. Try and attend the opening. And after the show come up for a bite to eat and a glass of beer.

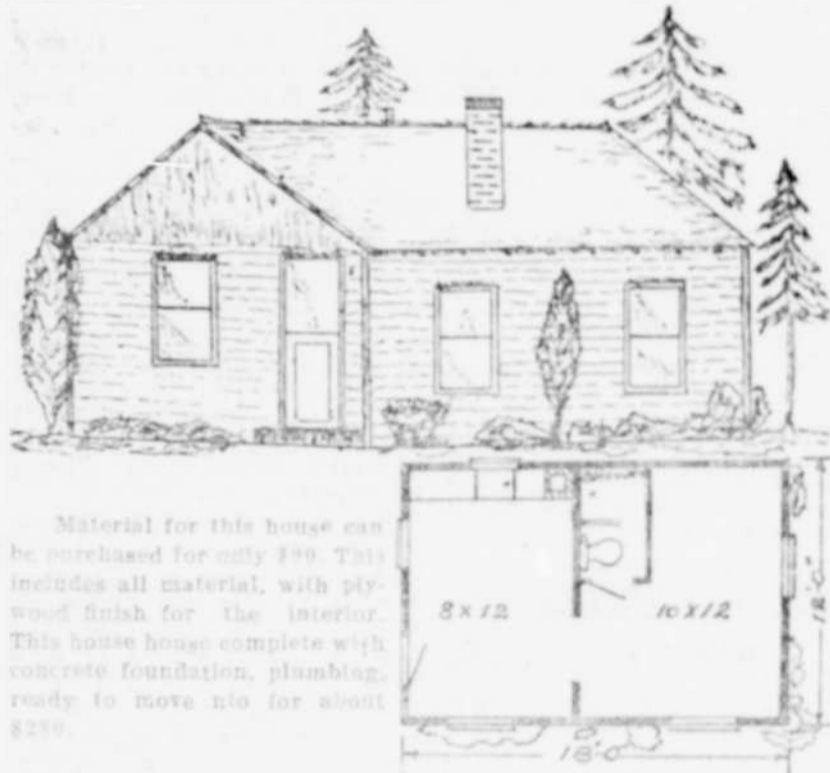

DISCOVERS LOVER IS AN EMBEZZLER; SURRENDERS LOOT

Beauty Shop Operator Learns "Heir" Is Defaulting Railroad Cashier.

Chicago.—A New York beauty shop operator who eloped to Chicago with an "heir" only to learn that he was married and an embezzler, visited Chicago long enough to lead the police to safe deposit boxes that contained \$19,455 of the embezzled funds.

The woman is Mrs. Dorothy Rayne. The man is Clifford F. Smith, forty years old, former cashier in New York for the Long Island railroad, who fled with Mrs. Rayne to Chicago after embezzling \$35,119 of the railroad's funds. Smith wrote the Pinkerton detective agency here that Mrs. Rayne had vanished with \$25,000 of the money, and that he was going to jump into Niagara falls.

Surrenders in New York.

Mrs. Rayne, who had returned to New York, saw the news accounts of Smith's peccadillo, she said, and surrendered to railroad officials there. They agreed not to prosecute her on her promise to help recover as much of the money as possible. She came here with New York police and railroad officials. They and Chicago policemen began a quest for the money.

The first safe deposit box visited was at the Amalgamated Trust and Savings bank. Distilled open, it yielded only a detective story magazine. A box Mrs. Rayne had rented at the Central Deposit vaults was empty. Five packages of cigarettes were found in a box at the Chicago Safe Deposit company. A fourth box at the Drexel State bank yielded a revolver.

\$19,455 Is Recovered.

From a box at the Continental Illinois Safe Deposit company, \$4,970 was recovered. The sixth box, which the searchers had to drill open, was at the American Trust and Safe Deposit company. It contained \$19,485.

Mrs. Rayne said she had rented the boxes and placed their contents in them at the request of Smith, and was unaware that the money had been stolen.

"He told me his aunt had left him the money," Mrs. Rayne said. "I thought he was single, and I loved him."

Carries Rusty Needle in Her Leg 54 Years

Springfield, Mass.—An X-ray examination at a local hospital has revealed a crochet needle, three inches long, in the left leg of Mrs. Rose Gordon. The needle, in a rusty condition, had been lodged in the limb for 54 years.

The victim sustained the accident when a child ten years old in Illinois, but for many years the injury was forgotten. Several weeks ago, however, the woman suffered from a serious complaint, which the doctors diagnosed as rheumatism.

The X-ray disclosed the needle, deeply imbedded in the surrounding tissues.

Austro-Hungarian Monarchy

Prior to the World war the Austro-Hungarian monarchy consisted of two states, the Austrian empire and the Hungarian kingdom. The relation between them was fully regulated by the so-called compromise of 1907. According to this agreement the two states were perfectly independent of each other, each possessing its own constitution, legislature and executive departments for most branches of state affairs. There was, however, a close political connection between them, through the identity of the sovereign and the community of certain departments of state affairs.
