Artificial Respiration Saves Cubs and Fawns

Wenatchee, Wash. — Artificial respiration, applied to young bear and deer which fall into Manson dume, about Lake Chelan, revives about 75 per cent, Game Protector A. E. Schaller reported.

A patrol crew along the concrete canal rescues about forty animals a year, Schaller said. Most are fawns, with an occasional bear cub. The youngsters fall in when they attempt to follow their mothers in a leap across. A 15-mile current sweeps them away, although the water is only 3 feet deep.

The artificial respiration in most cases revives the animals within an hour so they are able to run off into the hills again, Schaller said. It is applied in much the same manner as to human beings.

Each patient, after being pulled from the water, is covered with a heavy blanket to prevent a chill and placed so the water will drain from its lungs.

Mongrel Pup Discovers Body of Dead Playmate

Portland, Ore.—The barking of Skipper, a mongrel pup, ended a search for Winston Woodward, aged three, whose body was found in the marginal waters of the Willamette river after a long search by police and neighbors. Police found the dog trotting nervously along the river's edge where he had barked for hours in a vain attempt to bring aid to his playmate.

BONNEVILLE TO FURNISH CHEAPEST POWER IN U.S.

The Bonneville Dam area will enjoy the lowest power rates in United States, and one of the lowest in the world, if the recommendation of the national power policy committee, headed by Secretary of Interior Ickes, is adopted by PWA.

Months ago the federal power commission recommended rates of 1.25 mills at the dam; 1.59 mills in Portland, and 1.95 mills in Seattle. At the same time it pointed out that Seattle could buy power cheaper from Bonneville than from Coulee dam.

Final word in the matter of rates rests with PWA. However, President Roosevelt controls the situation and in the end is expected to tell his different committees what he wishes done.

The national power policy committee is composed of a group which includes Dr. Elwood Coad, head of the bureau of reclamation; Frank R. McNinch, of the federal power commission; Major General Markham, chief of army engineers, and others. To these men has been given the task of studying all factors which enter into the fixing of power rates.
