Ptomaine Poisoning Not From Canned Vegetables

For years there has been an idea among the general public that ptomaine poisoning can be contracted from eating canned goods. Ptomaine poisoning cannot come from canned fruits or vegetables—a botulismous poison may develop, says an authority, through the use of canned foods which have spoiled from under-processing or imperfect sealing, but such spoilage is always detected by swelling of the can, discoloration or unpleasant odor and such food should be discarded. The same applies to fresh foods. Canned foods, like any other food product are not always entirely blameless, but they present a minimum of danger. It is quite unusual in cases of poison to lay the blame on canned food, but not once has it been proven to be the cause.

Those who work in canneries invariably eat what their own factory packs, which proves the merit of the goods.

Since canned fruits and vegetables are prepared from the best of raw materials in a scientific and sanitary manner its food value must necessarily be high. All the vitamins that were in the fresh products are retained after they are canned.

Ice-Boring Flower From Alps Is Brought to U. S.

The blue moonwort, a beautiful spring flower from the high Swiss Alps, has the remarkable power of boring its way through a thick sheet of ice, flowering and going to seed before the ice has barely begun to melt, writes Robert Shostack, in the Washington Post. The appearance of the crocus flowers as they push their way through the snow is ever a source of joy and wonder to the flower lover, but the ability of a plant to drill a passage to the air and sunshine through nearly a foot of ice is just short of a miracle.

In the autumn the moonwort develops thick, leathery leaves, well stocked with fuel for the coming drilling operation. These blades lie flat on the ground all through the winter until the first water from the melting snows on top trickles down and arouses the dormant roots. Internal combustion of the starchy fuel produces sufficient heat in the sprouting stalk to melt away some ice about these uprising flower stems. As the ice gives way to nature's unusual heat drill, the moonwort stem gradually pushes its way to the pure mountain air and warm rays of the sun. The opening flowers are indifferent to the below zero night temperature, since the plant is able to surround itself with a blanket of its own heat, very much as a domestic animal protects itself from the winter cold.

First Act Authorizing National Highway Plan

The first act authorizing the construction of the national highway was passed in March of 1906 and proposed a road from Cumberland, Md., only to the state of Ohio. As the public believed that the river would be more than sufficient for all transportation west, the constitutionality of expenditures for a road this side of the river was raised and debated.

When the road approached the Ohio, the friends of further extension had to sweat blood to secure an appropriation of \$10,000 for locating a route for the road to the Mississippi. It was not until 1925 that congress appropriated \$150,000 to build a road to Zanesville and the next year \$170,000 to continue the work. Even by this time many were still vigorously opposed to so unpractical a project as a national road westward when the Ohio river could carry all the traffic.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Home of the Doves

Doves breed chiefly in British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and southern Nova Scotia and throughout the United States and Mexico and locally in lower California and Guatemala; they winter in southern Oregon, southern Colorado, the Ohio valley, and from North Carolina to Panama. The dove is casual in winter in the Middle States.
