

LEGION TO ASSIST IN ORGANIZING AN AUXILIARY AT DAM

Bonneville Post No. 38, American Legion has decided its organization is not complete without an auxiliary unit and a formulating plans to have such a unit installed. It is felt that an auxiliary unit will be an invaluable aid to the Legion post in its service and community work, as well as on the social and sentimental side of Legion progress.

The auxiliary is composed of the Mothers, wives, sisters, and daughters of members of the American Legion, and mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of men and women who were in the military service of the United States between April 2, 1917 and November 11, 1918 and who died in line of duty or after honorable discharge from the service and who are now members of the American Legion; also women, who of their own right, are eligible to membership in the American Legion.

Bonneville post will have an open meeting on their next regular meeting night at the Bonneville Community chapel on January 9, 1935, at 8 p. m., and after a short business session will assist in the formation of an auxiliary unit. Every eligible woman in the community is cordially invited to attend the organization meeting, and to become a charter member of the unit. An effort is being made to have Mrs. Cecilia Gunn, department president of Oregon, present at the meeting to explain the purposes of the auxiliary and to assist in the organizing of the local unit. All Legionnaires are asked to be present at the January 9th meeting, and to bring their mothers, wives, sisters and daughters.

The Legion auxiliary membership comprises the nearest and dearest of the Legion, and both organizations being devoted alike to patriotism and service to the community, state, and nation, they should go forward together, not only in the social activities of the community, but also in their work of upholding the principles and ideals upon which the great American republic of ours was founded and to aid in its development, to raise a voice for the maintenance of an adequate national defense, to assist in fostering its international friendships and maintaining peace, and to assist in the progress toward the other objectives of the American Legion and the American Legion auxiliary.

Despite weather conditions, work of putting down the base of a permanent road into the reservation goes on unabated.
