Puritans' Footgear

Shoes were brought to America by the first settlers. The Indians wore moccasins and the white men adopted them until Thomas Beard, a London shoemaker, came to Massachusetts in 1620, bringing a supply of leather, as well as a kit of tools, and became the first shoemaker on record in the colony. Puritans wore plain, square-toe shoes with buckles. Cavaliers wore great boots. Men of the Colonial and early Revolutionary period wore long stockings and low shoes with buckles. Women had one pair of coarse shoes for week-day wear and a pair of fine kid shoes for Sunday best. Farmers wore knee-high boots of heavy cowhide leather. Children's shoes were crude; in some cases the father's old boots were cut apart and made over into shoes for children.

How Nome Got Its Name

The earliest maps of Alaska drawn up by United States government cartographers didn't have names for all the bays, capes and inlets. Among the spots that were nameless was a cape which jutted far out into the Bering sea. Some early official, who disliked to see a map without the proper labels, pencilled across this cape the query, "Name?" A copyist, transcribing this map a little later, misread it and labeled the cape Nome. Nome it has been ever since, and when a city sprang up there it, too, became Nome.

Trial by Judge Favored

Trial by judge instead of by jury is gaining rapidly in popularity in this country. Those states which permit defendants to waive jury trials find that more than three-quarters of them prefer to do it because they believe a judge will give them a fairer trial than 12 inexperienced jurors who are likely to be unduly influenced by the prosecutor, the press and the prejudices which might arise from a defendant's religious, economic or social status.—Collier's Weekly.
