BRIDGE PIER READY FOR CONCRETE POURING

Pouring of concrete in the east pier of the Eagle creek bridge will be started late this week or the first of next week. Work on the pier has been held up pending the sinking of a hole which would permit the concrete to rest on solid rock.

The excavation, 40 feet deep, is finished and the cableway is in place. The contractors have had to go down much deeper than was anticipated, but kept up the search for a sound footing until they found it.

Contracts for the steel superstructure on the bridge will be let in April when the government starts work on relocation of the Union Pacific railroad tracks from Eagle Creek to Cascade Locks.
