LEGION DEMANDS DEFENSIVELY BIG ARMY AND NAVY

An adequate national defense not to foster war but to assure peace, and to afford proper protection for our nation's resources and homes, if war should be forced upon us, is one of the objectives toward which the American Legion is working.

The American Legion loves peace. Every one of its members saw service during the fighting days of the world war. Whether while in the service they faced death in muck-filled trenches, or sweated in training they learned from experience the devastating effects of war.

They want no more of it as long as it can be avoided with honor. That is why the Legion is demanding an adequate national defense, demands it not for aggression, but as the only insurance obtainable in this present day world of turmoil that this country shall not be despoiled. As long as the spirit of greed and conquest remains rampant abroad, America must be prepared to defend itself.

The American Legion demands only the military and naval strength that the nation's departments of defense have declared to be the minimum requirements.

The United States stands first in wealth and seventeenth in the strength of its army. The navy ranks last among the three outstanding maritime nations of the world. Our nation is fourth in population. Even China and tiny Greece have larger standing armies. This condition must be corrected and the Legion is directing its efforts to that important work.

It will submit a program to Congress calling for a standing army of 14,000 officers and 165,000 enlisted men, for a National Guard of 210,000 enlisted men and the proper complement of officers, for a reserve corps of 120,000 officers. R. O. T. C. in each university desiring it, and Citizen's Military Training Camps for not less than 50,000 youths per

year, to form the nucleus of a citizen army in time of emergency.

For the navy, the Legion program calls for immediate construction up to the full strength permitted by the London treaty, with a full complement of officers and men to man every ship.

An adequate air defense for our coasts and possessions, with the necessary trained personnel, modern equipment and reserve forces is also included in the program. The foregoing is, of course, only a brief resume of the entire program.

The American Legion feels that its national defense program is sound, reasonable and practical, and in the light of present world conditions, meager enough.

In its major points it differs little from the national defense programs of other leading organizations, but it is closely related to other major phases of the Legion's work, particularly Americanism.

It is also in line with the Universal Service Act which the Legion is sponsoring, and which would, in the event of war, conscript capital, industry and manpower, thus discouraging war by taking all the profit out of it.

The American Legion will lend hearty support to all sincere efforts to hasten the dawn of lasting world peace, whenever the time arrives that other nations are ready to consider disarmament on a permanent basis.

But as long as other nations remain armed, as long as they abrogate disarmament treaties, as long as they are committed to the spirit of conquest, just that long will the American Legion demand that the United States be prepared to defend itself.

The Legion's defense program is not super-militaristic and super-nationalistic, but is the most effective way to preserve the peace of the United States and contribute to the peace of the world.
