POLICE LOCATE CAR USED BY BANDITS

All northwest police officers have been called into the search for two men answering the description of the pair who last week held up W. D. Carey, manager of the Bonneville Operating company's dam office, and robbed him of \$2600 in small bills.

Thursday night, 36 hours after the hold-up, Portland police located the bandits' car. The machine had been rented from a "drive your-self garage" and had run 75 miles. Failure of the men to return it at the time they were supposed to incited the proprietor to issue the license number to law enforcement officers, and it was through this that the car was located.

However, one side of the car was marred by a huge hole, evidently made by an exploding shotgun. County officers released a former Community Center employee, now a carpenter's helper, who was suspected as being implicated in the affair and grilled without success. He has returned to his job, but is still under surveillance. Later in the week another suspect was picked up. He has fruitlessly questioned.

OIL COMPANIES RENEW INTEREST IN DISTRICT

Major oil companies renewed their interest in the Bonneville Dam district last week, as one large garage was started, ground was leased for a station and a deal was pending for the building of another.

P. E. Brockway and J. E. Nelson, Gresham business men, started preliminary preparations for a \$3,000 structure across from the Shady Nook station west of Bonny Villa. The pair plan to equip their building with the most modern equipment, both for minor servicing and repair work.

A salesman will take over the show-room, and will make house to house contacts displaying the Dodge and Plymouth automobiles. It is hoped to have the new place opened by no later than March 15.

Ben Scott, of The Dalles, signed a three-year lease for The Dalles Freight Line property formerly occupied by the shoe repairing office, and will get work under way as soon as possible on a Standard Oil station. If the new station requires too much room, the freight office will seek a more suitable location.
