**CRIBS DRESSED UP FOR YEARLY SPRING FRESHET**

Columbia Construction company's cofferdam was prepared for its "deep sea dive" last week, as workmen added material wherever necessary on the cribs, drove down more sheet piling and boxed over the completed cribs.

All the finishing touches will be completed within ten days officials said, far ahead of the coming spring high water, which will wash over the cofferdam to a depth of several feet.

Despite the swift current which will sweep with devastating force against the dam, it is doubtful that the freshet will have any damaging effect. The tons of material which have been poured into the huge 20-foot square cribs assure that.

Although 2,163,000 pounds of steel piling have been driven around the cribs in protective positions already, additional sheetpiling is one of the few remaining necessities. Others are completion of the small parapet on the west leg, which requires adding some two feet of material on six cribs and boxing a similar number on the east leg.

Inside the huge half moon the powerful Monaghan continued its excavation work last week, halting noticeably only once, while a huge boulder was blasted out of its way.

The monster electric drag line will complete digging the foundations for the south unit of the main spillway dam before the high-water, barring unexpected difficulties.
