Tanner Creek Viaduct Rises

Orino, Bell and Malcon, working in the Tooth Rock railroad tunnel, encountered their largest stream of water last week, blasts disclosing it high in the roof.

It was necessary to halt operation while a heavy timber arch was placed over the bad spot. This was the third time in the 300 feet progressed that the work necessitated timbering.

The arch will be left in place until ready for concrete pouring, one of the final steps. A drain pipe will then be installed, with its end passing under the tracks and out through the side of the 573-foot double-tracked tunnel.

Preliminary work, known as facing, was started on the west portal last week, but due to the limited dumping space it will be impossible to break out more than 2,000 yards at the west end.
