LOCKS PAIR INVENT OIL BURNING STOVE

An invention that may revolutionize the oil-burning range field has been perfected and patented by Lewis A. Zuiderduin and Mrs. Grace A. Scott, of the We-Ask-U-Inn restaurant in Cascade Locks.

The new burner, which consists of only three small parts, a down draft, outside control valve and a hot point, the latter includes the bottom plate, will cost only \$25 for installation in homes, \$35 for restaurants. It can be placed in the ordinary wood stove by simply removing the grates.

The burner, which Zuiderduin has been working on for five months, burns ordinary fuel oil, at a cost of three and one-half cents per hour. This is much cheaper than wood can be used. The chamber must, of course, be air-tight, which means that the stove's side draft must be cemented in.

Zuiderduin, who drew all specifications and patterns himself, finds in his work as chef that it offers better heat, less work and fewer worries than any stove he has ever worked over. To quote him, "It really works!"

John T. Anderson, of Portland, was patent attorney for the new invention, which the restaurant pair hope to make a national product. With the coming of summer they plan to start selling in the dam district. The stove is open to inspection at any time, to interested residents.

Plans For Fill On Bridge Laid

Orino, Bell and Malcolm is preparing to excavate gravel from the bed of Tanner Creek for the fill in the graceful Tanner Creek railroad viaduct, now under construction by Birkemeier and Saremal, sub-contractors.

This work cannot get under way until the bridge is completed, however. A check yesterday revealed all of 20 of the piers have been poured and are set, ten of the arch ribs have been poured, false work for three others is in and forms for five of the spandrel arch walls are completed.

When all of the ribs are poured and arch walls completed, the railroad contractors will set a fleet of trucks and an excavator to work in the creek, getting rock material for the fill, which will be five feet deep at the top of the arches and 28 feet at the base.

On top of this another fine gravel fill, two feet deep, must be placed and the steel rails laid in place. This work will come on a later contract, however.
