MCMILLEN LOSES MATCH, DIGNITY IN MAIN EVENT

Frank Sulewski won the main event on a foul, your reporter lost 20 cents and Sulewski's opponent, Eddie McMillen, was badly mugged up by five other grapplers, as Jim Merrill's weekly mat card came to a smashing close at the Locks pavilion Thursday night. And all because McMillen wrapped his hand with heavy friction tape before entering the ring for the final fall of the bout.

The rough show the moan and groaners were putting on had the fans, which were there, incidentally, in larger numbers, on the edge of their seats for the first 28 minutes. At that time the match was even-steven, Sulewski having taken a fall in 15:05 with whip wristlocks and a press, and McMillen evening the count 13 minutes later with a figure four, which includes a headlock, body scissors and double toe hold.

McMillen's hand was swathed in tape when he re-entered the ring, but this proved no reason for excitement until he had hit Sulewski three times with the bandaged hand and Frank had dropped to the mat an equal number. Angry shouts from the fans aroused the curiosity of Referee Keith Wesp, and he tried to investigate.

When he was also bounced to the floor by the Denver middle-weight champion, grappling friends of Sulewski took a hand, pummeling the lanky-legged ruffian unmercifully. Wesp raised the hand of Sulewski, 173, Seattle, on a foul, and away went 20 cents.

The semi-windup saw little Jimmie Bozely, Locks, make his initial start here against Farmer Stewart, 170-pound youngster from Salt Lake. Bozely plainly had neither the weight nor ability to grapple with Stewart, dropping falls early in the second and third rounds.

The four-round opener found Tony Darq, 158, Bonneville, meeting El Brady, 155, Gresham, for the third time in the dam district. But as always the speedy pair stole the show with their do-or-die determination to give the fans a treat.

As usual Referee Wesp, who has been nicknamed "Rough-house" for some uncalled-for reason, as he is as gentle as a lamb, came in for a major portion of the fun. Both grapplers enjoyed tripping up the official aroiter whenever they had leisure time, and the fans howled their delight.

The match was eventually called a draw, each taking a single fall in the four rounds, and the decision will also have to apply for the brief but effective free-for-all the pair staged after Wesp raised their hands.

WATER UNSIGHTED IN TWO DRAINAGE TUNNELS

Seven dreary 24-hour stretches found engineers at the 1300-foot mark in drainage tunnel one and the 534-foot mark in tunnel four yesterday, with the body of water known to be impounded under the famous Ruckel slide as yet unsighted.

Water is still pouring steadily out of the tunnels two and three, but these do not reach the main lake, as they go back only a short distance under the hill. The three-man crews are making an average of nearly seven feet a day, finding few stretches of crumbling material in their path.

FIRST JOB TO MIND

Fifty years ago E. J. McGuire, one of the few men now prospecting for gold in the dam district, secured his first job. He was straightening cans as they entered the packing chute in the Marshall Food Products company's cannery in Marshalltown, Iowa, at a salary of \$2 a day.

McGuire was 12 years old at that time. Since then he has never heard nor thought of the little mid-western town in which he once worked. Last week McGuire made one of his few trips into the Locks to stock up. In Bob Andrews' grocery he picked up a can of corn.

Beneath the glaring red label was the name Marshalltown. It took a few minutes for the name to sink in, but five minutes later McGuire was back 50 years, recalling happenings in the cannery. Details of his life, including those of a fortune made in the Alaskan gold rush of '49, but lost soon after, were recounted.
