CHILD'S LIFE SAVED BY FAST THINKING

TUNNEL EXCAVATION NEARLY COMPLETED

After two weeks of literally "running wild" through dice rock, Orino, Bell and Malcolm were within 20 feet of the end of the Tooth Rock railroad tunnel yesterday. Workers have come 600 feet through the point since work started last year, but never have the had to exercise the amount of caution they will in the last stretch.

The western end of the tunnel finds the rock fast thinning out on top, and only the lightest of blasts may be set off from now on, for fear that a hole may be torn through. In event that it was, workers would be forced to dig back into the bank to shorten the tunnel up, but this work reaps less profit to the contractors and is just about as difficult.

Facing on the west end got under way Friday, with six men and jackhammers cutting into the rock. Work on this side will be limited to 2,000 cubic yards, however, due to the lack of dumping space.

With completion of the tunnel excavation, workers must go back and trim out the rock to neat dimensions, then line the 32 by 36 foot interior with a thin shell of concrete. Engineers expect the tunnel to be the last project of the railroad relocation to be finished on this contract.
