Place Orders Now for the Chronicle's Book Length Story on Bonneville Dam Project

Single Copies Will Be Sold For 25 Cents, or 5 Copies for \$1.00. Orders May Be Mailed in, or Telephone 211 Cascade Locks, and Make Reservation on Number of Copies You Desire.

A copy of the edition will go to every subscriber. Other copies are being mailed to libraries in all towns and cities of more than 10,000. The edition will be limited in number, and for that reason orders for the number should be placed with The Chronicle. This is not necessary, but it is desirable, because reservations for more than 1,000 copies have already been received at The Chronicle office.

If you desire extra copies, mail a post card, send a note to the office or ring The Chronicle, 211 Cascade Locks. The magazine will be wrapped for mailing, so you will need only to place a stamp on the copies which you mail to friends and relatives in other states and to other communities in the Pacific northwest.

People everywhere are interested in knowing about the dam; they are curious to learn what may be expected to occur in the territory after the dam is completed. We believe the information obtained from the illustrated story of the dam, appearing in the Progress Number, will satisfy this curiosity.

This edition, printed in magazine form on 60-pound book paper, will carry stories and photographs on the Bonneville Dam and the Bonneville Dam Area. It is designed to give the public a picture of what has transpired in the district since work was started on the dam. It will contain scores of the latest photographs, covering every phase of the work at the dam, and of the individuals who are directing the building of the project. Many of these photographs are being purchased from the United States government, while others are being made by The Chronicle.

The task of getting out the edition has been much greater than anticipated, but we believe it will meet with universal approval. Preparation of the material requires time and patience. Numerous unavoidable delays have occurred, due to our desire to procure photographs from many sources and from many individuals.
