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ANTI-BONUS GROUPS OBJECT OF VETS SCORN

Opponents of immediate cash payment of adjusted compensation certificates may be divided into two groups. One comprises those persons who are more or less indifferent to the entire subject. These do little harm because their opposition is passive, rather than active. The other group, because it is self-seeking, because it has a selfish purpose and because it deliberately and repeatedly distorts and misrepresents facts in its campaign against payment of the certificates, constitutes a real and dangerous enemy to the cause of veteran welfare and to the patriotic ideals of this country.

Active opposition to immediate cash payment of World war veterans' adjusted compensation certificates is centered, almost exclusively, in the National Economy League and the American Veterans association. Why? Who makes up the membership of these two groups? What is the basis for their organized enmity to the cancellation of this national debt which is, after all, a legitimate and reasonable part of the necessary costs of the World war?

The answer to these questions may be found in an analysis of the class of citizens these organizations represent. This class comprises a small percentage of this nation's citizenry, who, to a vast extent, control the nation's wealth.

From one-half to two-thirds of the national revenue of the United States is obtained from individual and corporation income taxes. Less than five per cent of the people of this country pay the bulk of the national income.

They are very much interested in federal expenditures, these large income tax-payers. Federal expenditures are closely related to federal taxes. If federal expenditures can be curtailed, federal taxes will be more lenient on the pocketbooks of those in the millionaire class.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States is not opposed to the theory of big business nor to the legitimate profits which accrue from big business. But we most emphatically are opposed to any group of wealthy citizens who disclaim federal responsibility for the veteran in order to protect their own huge incomes and the taxes on those incomes.

Anyone who reads the public press knows the income tax invasions, the fraudulent "deals" and "transactions" by which many of the so-called leading citizens of this country avoid paying their fair share of taxes to the federal treasury. Yet we are asked to believe that such scheming and unpatriotic citizens have only the welfare of the country at heart when they oppose redeeming veterans' adjusted compensation certificates.

More than three million of the three and a half million veterans who hold the adjusted compensation certificates have taken advantage of the fifty per cent loan act of 1931, and have borrowed half of the face value of their certificates. This fact not only proves the need of the majority of veterans for the amounts due them, but approves the fallacy of any group opposed to the payment of the balance due on the certificates.

Those who oppose immediate cash payment of soldiers' adjusted compensation certificates are not only the enemies of the veterans who protected and defended this country in its need. They are, in the last analysis, enemies of the country itself for they

place their own selfish interests and personal profits above the welfare of the nation as a whole, and their own greed above the nation's debt of gratitude to the men who bore arms in its behalf in the great war.
