

**POSTOFFICE TO BE
ADVANCED TO 3D CLASS**

**Let's Take Advantage
of Our Opportunities**

From 1878 until 1896 Cascade Locks depended largely upon construction work at the locks for means of a livelihood. From 1896 until 1925 the town depended upon the Wind River Lumber company's sawmill for a livelihood. With the closing of the sawmill hard times fell upon the community. Times continued dull until the government started work on Bonneville dam.

The dam will be completed within two years. Meantime, the town may obtain an industry which will utilize low-cost electrical energy. And again it may not procure an industry. Greatest opportunity for an industry centers about lumbering. The Mount Adams country contains billions of feet of virgin timber, bulk of which must come out through the Columbia river. Probably 20 per cent of this timber is hemlock, and hemlock has little value, except for use in making pulp and paper.

Efforts to organize a company which would build a sawmill in Cascade Locks have been going on for months. Men familiar with lumbering recognize an opportunity to build here. And other men realize that the district possesses all of the advantages necessary to the pulp and paper industry.

Building of Umatilla dam and other project on the upper river would create a market for lumber. A mill in Cascade Locks would enjoy a decided advantage in production costs and transportation charges.

As yet no attempt has been made by any organized group in Cascade Locks to obtain data bearing on volume of timber available, or other information which men in the lumber and pulp industry are going to demand when they put money into a mill. To The Chronicle it ap-

pears that the time has come for action. Much of our community energy is being wasted on small things—on petty quarrels. A concerted drive for a mill might bring in a plant which would mean a large payroll over a long period of time. And from a lumber mill could come any number of allied industries, chief of which is pulp and paper and rayon.

Cost of assembling data would be comparatively small. The effort expended would not be wasted. Only leadership is required to put a drive for the first industry in motion. Outside capital can be interested, but not seriously until facts bearing upon acreage, costs, sites and other subjects are brought together in a quick assimilated form.

**MRS. E. B. HILL GIVEN
\$72,500 FOR PROPERTY**

A jury in the United States district court at Portland Friday awarded Mrs. E. Bell Hill \$72,500 for her property, which overlooks the dam in Bonneville. The federal government had appraised the property at \$26,500. She went to court after refusing to accept the sum fixed by appraisers.

Months ago United States engineers took portions of the property for use in developing the area immediately adjacent to the reservation. The tract originally contained 40 acres, but the late Sam Hill gave away three acres on the highway. These three acres are embraced in the business district, on the highway.

In the first court action Mrs. Hill obtained an award of \$75,000. The government objected and asked for a new trial. The last trial occupied a week of the court's time and left the situation about where it was a year ago.
